Dansk Droge (vitamins, minerals and OTC pharmaceuticals) was acquired in 2003 by Polaris Private Equity. Turnover in 2006 was approx. 100 Mio. USD and 225 employees. Dansk Droge was sold to the Norwegian Orkla Group, and its name was changed to Axellus (now Orkla Health).

Winnie Papir (gift wrap and gift articles) and an English design and trading company were acquired separately and merged by LD Equity and had a turnover in 2008 of approx. 50 mio. USD and 120 employees.

Dagrofa was the third largest retail and wholesale company in Denmark, and it had extensive activities throughout the food supply industry in Denmark and the North Atlantic region.
